A journal paper :

A book :

2. Bellman, R. & Cooke, K.L. *Differential-Difference Equations*, 2nd edn, pp. 342-348. New York: Academic Press (1963).

A chapter in an edited volume (including conference proceedings):

3. Bellman, R., Cooke, K.L. & Dyson, A. Shock dynamics in metals. In: *Proc. Int. Conf. on Behaviour of Materials* (eds J.L. Miller & R.F. Smith), vol. 2, pp. 173-183. Oxford: Pergamon Press (1965).

Journal titles: due to the proliferation of journals with unfamiliar titles in recent years, titles should be given in full except where abbreviations are well established. The copy editor can abbreviate, but may not be able to guess the meaning of a cryptic abbreviation.

Numbering: references can be either numbered in sequence as they first appear, or in alphabetical order of first author.¹ The numbers should be placed in square brackets in the text.

References to websites: URLs should be given as footnotes.

Personal communications should be stated in the text.
